

A Farmer's Guide to Solar



How do I **get solar** on my house or barn?

Solar is available as a power choice in all fifty states, territories, and the District of Columbia. Though they vary state by state, the three main options for going solar are:

- 1 Purchase** a solar system (with cash or a loan) and own both the system and all the power it produces.
- 2 Lease** a system, usually for a fixed monthly rate, and own all the power it produces.
- 3 Enter** a "power purchase agreement" (PPA) to buy the electricity the system produces, which can change from month to month.

As with any major purchase, it is important to receive multiple quotes and do thorough research on which system may be right for you and why.

How do I **host solar** for my farm or land?

There are three main ways that farmers and landowners can benefit from hosting solar:

- 1 Lease farmland** to a solar company and be reimbursed for hosting a project.
- 2 Install solar power** on your home or barn.
- 3 Host an agrivoltaics project**, which involves growing crops or grazing livestock underneath solar panels.
